## RECORD Buys The Lititz Express

Newspapers To Be Merged Next Week; Other Changes Will Be Made Shortly

The record running co., publisher of THE LITITZ RECORD, has purchased The Lititz Express from Nevin E. Danner and beginning next week will consolidate the two papers into one.

The consolidation of the papers comes three months after Mr. Danner purchased The Express from John G. Zook, who founded it more than half a century ago and published it up until March 1 of this year. Mr. Danner will probably return to his home at Spring Grove, Pa., for the present, and Arthur K. Willy, the editor of The Express, will go to New York.

Miss Phyllis King, of The Express staff, who was injured several weeks ago in an auto accident, was released from the Lancaster General Hospital yesterday and left for her home in Illinois.

While the most obvious change in the Record will be the return to a full-sized newspaper, there will be many other changes immediately.
