Fairy tales and fables are magical or unbelievable stories for children that sometimes teach a lesson and often lead to a happy ending. Fairy tales don't always include fairies.



Mythology is all of the stories (myths or legends) a group of people tell to explain nature, history, and their traditions. A myth might be only partly true or not true at all.



Fantasy is a kind of story that includes imaginary or magical people, places, and creatures. Fantasy stories may be set in the past, present, or future.

The hero

A hero is a person who has done something special that is admirable. A hero might stand up for the weak and powerless, using courage or rare skills to do good things. A hero may protect or save others from bad things.



The Three Little Pigs



Mysterious Magic


The word "magic" is used to describe actions that seem impossible. A person using magic might make an item disappear or turn one animal into another. Dragons, unicorns, and fairies are examples of magical or fantastical creatures.



A fairy godmother or similar magical helper sometimes appears in a story to assist a struggling character, such as poor Cinderella.

Cinderella

One of the most popular versions of the Cinderella story was written in 1697 by French author Charles Perrault. He added the fairy godmother, pumpkin carriage, and glass slippers.











The Mouse and the Lion


"Don't hurt me!" begged the poor mouse. "Please let me go, and someday I will repay you."


The lion thought it was funny that a tiny mouse imagined she could help him, but he was generous and let her go.


"You laughed when I said I would repay you," said the mouse. "Now you see that even a little mouse can help a big lion."


Fairy tales, myths, fables, and fantasy stories sometimes teach a lesson. The lesson, or moral, of a story may help kids understand something

Fantasy

Fantasy stories explore ideas that are different from the things we hear and see every day. Sometimes fantasy stories connect super skilled or magical people or places to our world. Sometimes such stories take place in imaginary worlds.



Fantasy might explore a past or future where humans have developed technology or science knowledge and inventions that we have not or might never achieve.

Legends


A legend is similar to a myth. Legends are stories handed down from earlier times. Some legends are about real people but usually aren't completely true.
