***Mrs. Lincoln's Sisters* by Jennifer Chiaverini**

The story of Mary Todd Lincoln and her sisters is told in this compelling story of love, loss, and sisterhood rich with history and suspense.

***Song of a Captive Bird* by Jasmin Darznik**

A debut novel about the trailblazing Iranian poet Forugh Farrokhzad, who defied society's expectations to find her voice and her destiny.

***Remarkable Creatures* by Tracy Chevalier**

Mary Anning discovers a fossilized skeleton near her 19th century home that triggers upheavals throughout the religious, scientific, and academic communities.

***Chariot on the Mountain* by Jack Ford**

A female slave struggles for freedom in the decades before the Civil War as she's freed by her owner, kidnapped by slave catchers and returned to Virginia.

***The General's Cook* by Ramin Ganeshram**

Hercules, President George Washington's chef, is famous for both his culinary prowess and for ruling his kitchen like a commanding general.

***The Christie Affair* by Nina de Gramont**

A beguiling novel of star-crossed lovers, heartbreak, revenge, and murder—and a brilliant re-imagining of one of the most talked-about unsolved mysteries of the twentieth century.

***Loving Frank* by Nancy Horan**

Chronicles the relationship between architect Frank Lloyd Wright and Mamah Cheney.

***Godmersham Park* by Gill Hornby**

A richly imagined novel inspired by the true story of Anne Sharp, a governess who became very close with Jane Austen and her family

***The Velveteen Daughter* by Laurel Davis Huber**

The story of Margery Williams Bianco, author of *The Velveteen Rabbit*, and her daughter Pamela, a world-renowned child prodigy artist whose fame at one time greatly eclipses her mother's.

***A Piece of the World* by Christina Baker Kline**

Christina Olson seems destined to a small life with her health struggles, but becomes the subject of a well-known Andrew Wyeth painting.

***Finding Dorothy* by Elizabeth Letts**

When Maud Gage Baum learns that her late husband's masterpiece, *The Wizard of Oz*, will be adapted for the screen, she sets about trying to finagle her way onto the set to make sure the producers stay true to the spirit of the book.

***The Paris Bookseller* by Kerri Maher**

The dramatic story of how a humble bookseller fought against incredible odds to bring one of the most important books of the 20th century to the world.

***Apeirogon* by Colum McCann**

When two grieving fathers, one Palestinian and the other Israeli, learn one another's stories and the loss that connects them, they become part of a much larger tale that ranges over centuries and continents.
